WHEREAS, the Town Board has reviewed its past practices in the negotiation and approval of Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) to amend the Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA) between the Town and the United Public Service Employees Union and,

WHEREAS, questions have arisen as to whether the Town has been following the legally required procedures for negotiations and approval of MOA's to amend the CBA and if not the current status of the most recent and earlier MOA's and

WHEREAS, the Town Board believes it is in the best interest of the Town to seek competent labor attorney advise on these issues, and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has previously engaged Roemer Wallens Gold and Mineaux LLP to advise the Board on labor issues involving the Highway Department personnel and been satisfied with their assistance;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Peter Humphries, the Councilperson with responsibility for the Highway Department, is authorized to negotiate an engagement agreement with Roemer Wallens Gold and Mineaux LLP subject to approval of the Town Board.

Councilman Humphries was going to get information about the cost and timeline, therefore the resolution was tabled.

Power Plan Facility

Offered by Councilman Boms

Seconded by Councilwoman McKnight

WHEREAS, Danskammer Energy, LLC "Danskammer", seeks a permit

through the State of New York's Article 10 of the Public Service Law Power Plant Siting Process to build and operate a new power facility, similar in design to the CPV (Competitive Power Ventures) power plant, which is expected to generate approximately 550 megawatts of power via combustion of methane ("natural gas"), obtained via horizontal hydraulic fracturing ("fracking"); and

WHEREAS, no process has been put into place for the Orange County Executive and the Orange County Legislature to meet with public health, public

interest, community, or environmental groups despite substantial evidence of public opposition to the proposed power plant; and

WHEREAS, the existing Danskammer Power Plant will probably not be able to meet new emissions standards and is therefore likely to be decommissioned,

raising questions about the best means to provide power for electric needs following the closure of Indian Point; and

WHEREAS, the site proposed for construction of the new Danskammer facility flooded badly in Superstorm Sandy and its operation would require storage of aqueous ammonia and diesel in a highly flood prone area, threatening toxic exposures of the Hudson River and its organic life, including plants, fish, and water birds and animals; and

WHEREAS, the proposed new facility will operate continuously, bringing at

least a 10-fold increase in emissions of air pollutants such as nitrogen oxide, carbon monoxide, and volatile organic compounds and a dramatic increase in local air pollution in the city of Newburgh and the entire region; and

WHEREAS, the Hudson Valley contains some of the most polluted air in all of New York State if not the country, with Orange County receiving a C grade;

Putnam, Dutchess, and Rockland counties receiving D grades; and Westchester an F grade, due to high ozone days summarized in the 2017 American Lung Association report; and

WHEREAS, together the air pollution in these five counties (Orange, Putnam, Dutchess, Rockland, and Westchester) contributes causally to more than 43,000 children with pediatric asthma, 152,000 adults with asthma, 85,000 adults with Chronic Obstructive Pulmonary Disease and 1,200 people with lung cancer and worsens the health of many additional individuals already suffering due to cardiovascular disease, diabetes, and poverty;

WHEREAS, a new constructed baseline Danskammer power plant would be a new major natural gas consumer that will necessitate additional drilling and fracking over the 40-year lifetime typical for such a facility, leading to toxic pollution in distant host communities, generating expansion of gas delivery infrastructure, and producing extremely high volumes of contaminated and radioactive fracking wastewater, which is pumped into injection wells, including in New York State, for permanent underground storage, threatening drinking water sources; and

WHEREAS, increased consumption of methane for production of power further binds New York State and the entire country to a climate degrading source of energy production for generations to come; and

WHEREAS, the current proposals do not require taking down the existing power plant on the Hudson River, and the new facility would be taller than the existing plant, adding a harmful, menacing aesthetic impact on the riverfront; and

WHEREAS, the American Wind Energy Association ranks New York eleventh in the nation for installed wind generation capacity, with twenty wind energy project operating by the spring of 2014 and two additional wind power projects under construction in New York, with a third under active review; and

WHEREAS, the State of New York recently passed the Climate Leadership

and Community Protection Act (CLCPA) which, in summary, established programs, obligations and targets to meet zero emissions by 2050, 70% renewable by 2030 and the electrical sector to be carbon free by 2040; and

WHEREAS, the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act

(CLCPA) codifies Governor Andrew Cuomo's nation-leading commitments to install 9,000 megawatts of offshore wind by 2035; 6,000 megawatts of distributed solar by 2025; and 3,000 megawatts of energy storage by 2030, without any suggestion that new fracked gas power plants are mandated or necessary;
