

From the Desk of Melinda McKnight

Supervisor's message: By the numbers

The warm daytime temperatures for much of this Fall season have been delightful. It's also been a busy season that included a number of lovely events sponsored by the Hurley Heritage Society and libraries that brought our community together. The first Tomorrow Peoples Pow Wow, a collaboration between the Indigenous community and the Town of Hurley, took place at the Town Park in West Hurley Sept. 30 and Oct. 1. In spite of some rain and mud, the event was an inspiring demonstration of the resilience of Indigenous peoples and their various cultures.

The fall also has been busy at the Town Hall due to the New York Statemandated budget schedule. In July, worksheets were distributed to Town Continued on page 2

BUDGET APPROVED: The Town Board on Monday, Oct. 30, approved the 2024 Hurley budget, which totals \$3,815,773 and keeps the property tax levy at the 2023 level.

The combined General Fund and Highway Fund appropriations in the budget are 3.7% smaller than the 2023 total. The 2024 tax levy is \$2,347,261, unchanged from 2023.

The budget was to be voted on at the Town Board's Nov. 14 meeting, but with no changes made at the Oct. 30 meeting, a motion was made for early approval.

Several schedule adjustments at Town Hall this month

The Town Hall, at 10 Wamsley Place, be closed for business on four weekdays in November:

- Tuesday, Nov. 7, for Election Day. (The building will be open as a polling place.)
- **Friday, Nov. 10,** for Veterans Day, which falls on Saturday, Nov. 11. *The Town Transfer Station will be closed Nov. 11.*
- Thursday, Nov. 23, for Thanksgiving.
- Friday, Nov. 24, for Native American Heritage Day.



Also, the Town Board will meet only once in November, rather than the usual twice. The meeting will be on Tuesday, Nov. 14, in the Town Hall, beginning at 7 p.m.

The Planning Board, which typically meets on the fourth Thursday of the month, will meet a week later in November, on Thursday the 30th – at 6 p.m. in the Town Hall – because Thanksgiving falls on the 23rd.

department heads, and they were returned in late August. During that time, work on aspects of the Town's 2024 budget that are not tied to individual departments takes place. As Town Supervisor, I analyze various sources of revenue and any anticipated increase in expenses for the following year. Then comes the task of making all costs and revenues work without raising property taxes. I am happy to report the tax levy will remain flat next year at \$2,347,261 (\$828,161 for the General Fund, \$1,519,100 for the Highway Fund).

Also on the fiscal front, the Town in September received the results of Fiscal Stress Monitoring conducted by the Office of the New York State Comptroller, and the news was great: Hurley is not experiencing fiscal stress.

The report – released on Sept. 26 by Comptroller Thomas DiNapoli – shows Hurley with a **Fiscal**

Score of 3.3. Scores are on a scale of zero to 100; the lower the score, the less fiscal stress a municipality is experiencing. The scoring system is as follows:

- 45 to 54.9 indicates a municipal government is "susceptible to fiscal stress."
- 55 to 64.9 indicates "moderate fiscal stress."
- 65 and higher indicates a municipality is under "significant fiscal stress."

The same report noted the Town of Hurley has a "negative operating deficit," which is the Comptroller's way of saying the Town had an operating surplus for Fiscal Year 2022. The surplus of \$200,751.62 was allocated to Hurley's Capital Reserve Fund at a Town Board meeting held on Dec. 27, 2022.

Town gains access to landfill cleanup money from New York State

The former Town of Hurley Landfill, at 1043 Dug Hill Road, has been classified a New York State Superfund site due to contamination from PFOA (perfluorooctanoic acid) and PFOS (perfluorooctanesulfonic acid), according to the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation.

The designation means Hurley will have access to

more than \$1 million from the state for remediation.

The contamination dates to the period when the landfill operated, from the 1960s to the mid-1990s. The presence of PFOS, however, wasn't known until after New York State started testing for it in 2018.

AROUND THE TOWN HALL: Info from our departments

Assessor's Office: The office is sending renewal notifications in November to residents ages 65 and up who have limited income and currently receive the exemption available to them.

Residents who turn/ed 65 in 2023 should reach out to the Assessor's Office to find out if they quality for the Enhanced STAR exemption or the exemption for seniors with limited income. The office can be reached at (845) 331-7474, option 4, or assessor@townofhurley.org. The deadline to file exemption forms with the Assessor's Office is March 1, 2024.

If you are a new property owner in Hurley, you should register with New York State for the Basic STAR credit by calling (518) 457-2036 or going to the website tax.ny.gov/star.

Town Clerk's Office: The Town Clerk's Office is preparing to offer an online option for residents to look up and pay their tax bills. The platform is expected to be operational by Jan. 1, 2024.

These services are being implemented for Ulster County's town by the county Department of Finance, and we are excited to make them available to you.

Planning/Zoning: The Town Planning Board, which typically meets on the fourth Thursday of the month, will meet a week later in November, on Thursday the 30th, because Thanksgiving falls on the 23rd. The meeting will start at 6 p.m. in the Town Hall, 10 Wamsley Place.

The Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) will meet on Thursday, Nov. 9, if necessary, starting at 7 p.m. in the Town Hall. (Keep an eye on the Town website for updates.)

Elections are upon us; here's what you need to know



Hurley residents have the opportunity to vote in town, county and regional races this election season.

Voters will elect the Town Supervisor, Town Clerk, Town Highway Superintendent, two Town Board members and two Town Justices; as well as the Ulster County Executive and District Attorney, a county legislator, and three State Supreme Court Justices. There also are two state and two county propositions on the ballot. The text of each proposition is posted at tinyurl.com/2jjebne8.

Sample ballots for each voting district in the county can be found at tinyurl.com/44bj4chz. (There are two ballots for Hurley because part of the town is in Ulster County Legislature District 18 and part is in District 23.)

Early voting began Saturday, Oct. 28, and runs through Sunday, Nov. 5, at locations at Ellenville, Marlborough, New Paltz, Olive, Saugerties and the City of Kingston. Voters can cast ballots at any of the locations, regardless of where in Ulster County they live. Specific locations and hours are posted at tinyurl.com/ynfudyyt.

To find your polling place in Hurley if you plan to vote on Election Day, Nov. 7, go to tinyurl.com/5xnd2xjh, and enter the requested information. Voting hours on Election Day are 6 a.m. to 9 p.m.
